High School Roadmap – 9th/10th Grade

- Meet with your counselor to discuss your goals and plans
- ✓ Create a 4-year high school plan
- ✓ Keep track of your progress with a high school roadmap
- Enroll in the right courses
 - ✓ Speak to your counselor to recommend appropriate courses for college readiness
 - ✓ Consider enrolling in AP/DE/AICE/IB courses (earn college credit while in high school)
- Research what colleges search for in high school transcripts
- ✓ Think about your life after high school
 - √ What are your interests?
 - ✓ What are your goals?
 - ✓ Complete a Career Inventory Test
- ✓ Plan and study for standardized testing (PSAT-10th Grade)

- ✓ Fine tune your study habits!
- Start to develop community service projects (quality over quantity)
- Enroll in a wide variety of clubs, sports, and after-school activities
 - ✓ Consider leadership roles
- √ Consider summer internships (some are paid)

Grade Point Average (GPA)

- Your GPA is the Grade Point Average based on your grades
- Taking high school classes in middle school begins impacting your GPA
- Unweighted vs. Weighted GPA
 - Honors classes give you 1 extra point
 - AP, IB, AICE, and DE classes give you 2 extra points for A's and B's and 1 extra point for C's
 - Dual Enrollment grades are part of your college GPA
- College Bound Hint: Colleges may ask you for your Weighted or Unweighted GPA.

Acceleration Options via Dual Enrollment

- Allows high school students an opportunity to enroll in post-secondary courses and receive both high school and post-secondary credits while still in high school.
- The grades earned in dual enrollment classes will also be calculated toward their post-secondary GPA.
- Courses are free of charge, including textbooks.
- Depending on availability, some dual enrollment classes can be taken at the high school site or on the college/university campuses.
- Students are encouraged to consult their school counselor to determine eligibility and course selection.



Other Acceleration Options (AP/IB/AICE)

- Enrolling in AP/IB/AICE courses offers:
 - Benefits to students while they are still in high school
 - Positively impacting a student's GPA
 - Standing out in the college admission process
 - College credit is awarded to students with passing scores
- Research indicates that students who enroll in advanced courses are more likely to graduate college in four years.
- Students that graduate with an IB/AICE diploma are guaranteed Full Bright Futures Scholarship.
- Meet with your college advisor or school counselor for guidance and to avoid course repeatability.

Community Service

- High schools require students to earn hours by helping in the community.
- Service should be done through nonprofit organizations and community events.
- Quality over quantity. Project-based service.

College Bound Hint:

- Your college applications will shine if you participate in multiple hours of community service.
- It is recommended to complete 25 hours of community service per school year.
- Community service hours can contribute to college scholarships for example Florida Bright Futures.










College Readiness Exams

- <u>PSAT- Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test</u> (May be taken as early as 9th Grade)
- <u>SAT- Scholastic Assessment Test</u> (Spring 11th grade to Fall of 12th Grade)
- <u>ACT American College Test</u>
 (Spring 11th grade to Fall of 12th Grade)
- <u>PERT Postsecondary Education Readiness Test</u> (May be taken as early as middle school)



PSAT and Khan Academy

- PSAT results are available mid-December!
- The SAT is the only college admission test that offers FREE SAT practice tailored to each student.

College Fair and College Visits Questionnaire

Use these questions as a guide when meeting with college representatives. Take good notes and really try to get a feel for what the institution offers you. Imagine yourself as a student there for the next four years: What else might you want to know?

<u>Important Dates:</u> Ask about Early Decision deadlines/Regular application deadlines/Financial aid application deadline/Campus housing deadlines.

Admission Questions:

- · What was the average GPA of the entering freshman class?
- What was the average SAT/ACT scores of the entering freshman class?
- What are my chances for being accepted? (Show your personal brag sheet of high school resume.)
- · Which high school courses are required for admission?
- · How many years of a foreign language are required for admission?

General Questions:

- What can this school offer me that is different from, better than, or more unique than similar schools?
- · How would you describe the typical student?
- How large is your campus?
- What is the average class size?
- What is the nature of the faculty? (If a large school or university, ask what percent
 of classes are taught by graduate students.)
- · What are the five strongest majors at your institution?
- What type of high school background are you looking for in an applicant?
- How can I arrange a campus visit? Are there any special visitation days on your campus?
- · Do you accept Advanced Placement test credits? If so, with what scores?
- · What percentage of a typical freshman class will graduate from your college?

- What is the college's procedure for class placement in English and Mathematics?
- · Do you have programs for study abroad?
- How important is student government? Sports? A Greek System?
- When must I choose a major?
- What procedure is used to assign a faculty advisor when the student is undecided as to the major area of study?
- What additional academic services do you offer to students (tutoring, career counseling, study skills)?
- How does your institution place students in their freshmen classes?
- · What types of extra-curricular activities are on campus?

Housing Questions:

- Is there adequate housing for all your student? If not, what arrangements are made? How many students reside on campus?
- How are roommates selected?
- · What are some of the rules and regulations which govern residence halls?
- Is your school a "suitcase college" on weekends (i.e. commuter school)? If not, what are some popular weekend activities for students on campus?
- · How safe is your school? Where can I obtain statistics about crime on campus?



Free Application for Federal Student Aid

- FAFSA unlocks over \$122 billion in aid a year.
- Receiving almost any form of financial aid
 — including federal, state, and collegesponsored grants, educational loans, and
 work-study programs <u>begins</u> with
 completing the FAFSA.
- Most financial aid is awarded on a firstcome, first-served basis, so submit your FAFSA as soon as possible after October 1st.
- The Department of Education recommends 1-2 hours to fill out the application, and there's a toll-free help hotline: 1-800-433-3243.
- A FAFSA can be submitted electronically or by mail.

Additional Local Vocational Programs

Miami Dade College (MDC) offers College Credit Certificates (C.C.C.)

- These College Credit programs are certified by the FLDOE and require fewer credits than an Associates degree. These credits can also be applied towards an Associates degree.
- MDC will award students with an institutional College Credit Certificate upon completion.
- MDC currently offer 87 programs, including: Accounting Technology Management, Air Cargo Management, Banking Operations, Digital Forensics, Enterprise Cloud Computing, and Paramedic, just to name a few.
